1250	In 1971 she was invited by a hockey friend to a Pollys dance. K asked if she could get involved. About 25% of the membership were women.	
1414	After a disagreement she decided to quit but then got a phone call from 4 members to ask her back. She was elected Vice President and later was elected President	
1459	K discovers that the constitution was a one page hand written document that had never been passed at any meeting, and advised the members to have the constitution passed by a meeting, because they could be open to litigation as individuals.	
1650	The constitution was drawn up by a lawyer friend and passed at a meeting and registered as the constitution.	
1730	The money they raised would be saved until December and then divided between charities and Pollys where it would be used to cover running costs.	Pollys;
1817	K has worked as an office manager, purchasing officer, dispatch clerk, warehouse supervisor, sales clerk, and driven a taxi.	
1858	There weren't many venues for girls so tended to go to the boys venues. The Park Inn a.k.a. the Pork Inn that was in Oxford Street opposite Centennial Park (now the Centennial Hotel) run by Ken Johnson. It has a small stage where Ken put on drag show which was no bigger than the size of a car and there was dancing. 1946	K was 21 in 1969 and the majority who went there were women.

2042	Women also went to Capriccios. K and the hockey players would go out on a Saturday night to the Student Prince in Camperdown or the Bayswater Inn in Bayswater Road, depending on the season. 2135	In the hockey club there was a wide mix of professions.	
2240	K explains that the Pollys dances were every 2 months and these were intermixed with these other two venues.	Pollys dances;
2300	Polly-limpics was run by Pollys. Binnie Beef would be hired to feed the masses – hundreds of people. It was held at Erskineville Oval, Mascot Oval, North Ryde, Fairfield – where ever they could get a field. It has started not long before K had joined Pollys. 2430	Can remember it as a time when everyone could get together and it was a chance to show your competitiveness. She can remember hand bag tossing. But there were very good athletes and the more competitive events were the 100 metres, the 440 and the 880. They had to lay the fields for these events. Once they included long jump when the fields had a sandpit.	
2600	About 400 – 500 attended. There weren't too many clubs. It was more individuals and their little groups. Cronulla Gay Group, Boomerangs, Clover attended.	Cronulla Gay Group;

2820	Raising money for charity benefited the recipients and the gay community as well, because it gave them a venue, time to socialize their own groups of people.	
2920	Dances were advertised by word of mouth and the Group has a mailing list.	
3000	Mentions an organization who wanted to use the Pollys mailing list. A thinly disguised paedophile group and Pollys referred it on to the police.	Paedophile Group
3052	The Pollys were about giving people a venue, a good time and socializing.	
3124	Garry Trotter just started when K finished at Pollys and K pays tribute to Garry for keeping the organization going.	Garry Trotter; Pollys;

3244	Planning shows. They has a group of 3 that put it all together – they did the music, choreography, (particularly Amber). It was a small group effort rather than individuals. Each person made their own costume. When Karen couldn't made one, one of the boys outfitted her and they didn't ask for any money and costumes were donated to the group by members. 3435	They didn't participate in other events with other groups because they were too busy with their own shows and their jobs. Some times they would go out as a small group and have dinner.	
3625	K says there was never any problem with violence. They had regulars who would book a table for 10 or 20. "They were ladies and they were gentlemen and they behaved as such". "You would always get to know the people coming in"	
3822	Karen and Bill (Secretary) attended early Mardi Gras meetings. Pollys held one of the concessions at the first dances – paid for it. They sold hamburgers. The second year they ran the Cloak room at the Showground.	Bill; Mardi Gras; Cloak Room;

4203	Pollys entries for the parades were like a show but on a float. Same preparation but its purpose was to raise awareness for what they did rather than money for charity. They consistently put in a float over the years.	Mardi Gras Parade;
4345	Men and women in the group were like brothers and sisters. K relates how she would walk into the change room of half naked performers and this didn't anyone.	
4440	K talks about coming out to her mother and after she calmed down said "as long as you're happy, I'm happy".	
4600	Her mother was born in Kempsey and at age 3 was taken from her mother. She was part of the stolen generations. She was sent out to work when she was 13. Her birth was never registered.	Kempsey; Stolen Generation;
4750	Karen's family supports her and loves her girlfriend. The Aboriginal community is also supportive and non-judgemental. At work she came out in 1988 at the Taxation Office because she was holding a number of posts – on the EEO Committee, Harassment Contact Officer, Aboriginal Liaison Officer (Customers and staff). 5100	Karen's social life was non existent until she got involved with sport and Pollys. She did not relationships with women in the hockey team or in Pollys because it was too close to home. She has met her partners at work and at social gatherings.
