He was in touch with Frank Moller (who later worked for Tom Uren), Julius Rowe (president of ANU Students Association), and a lot of feminists. 2915	Trucks moving uranium from Lucas Heights to the docks got through as a result of police bashing picketers. The wharfies refused to load the uranium. 4725	When he arrived "it was a stand up fight" in Darlinghurst Road. Police had blocked the road and set among the marchers "and arresting people and it was a chaotic riotous moment". He knew when he arrived he had to join in. He left his girlfriend and "got involved in trying to rescue people who were being pulled by the police into paddy wagons". 10130	He heard people in the cells talk about the march exhorting people out of the gay bars and that the march had brought together a broad range of gays. 10425	He attended the 4 <sup>th</sup> National Homosexual Conference. He was peripheral and ambiguity about being there. Attended with Leigh Holloway and wanted to understand gay politics post mardi gras for the CPA.
